
Special Thanks Lou Ann Biermann!

Danielle Carpenter, MD

Dr. Carpenter joined the faculty in the Department of Pathology at SLU in 2017 as an Associate Professor. She completed her undergraduate studies at Saint Louis University where she then stayed for medical school, graduating in 2007. She completed residency training in anatomic and clinical pathology at Barnes Jewish Hospital/Washington University in St. Louis, followed by fellowship in Surgical Pathology, and finally Liver and Gastrointestinal Pathology (under the tutelage of Dr. Elizabeth Brunt). As this year comes to a close, we want to give thanks and reflect on the things made possible through your generosity. We deeply appreciate the support from our Board, Sponsors, Individual Donors and our Volunteers. We are grateful to those who came out to support our three fundraising events, Shoot for a Cure, Swing for a Cure, and the 19th annual Diamonds Gala. These events promoted understanding and awareness of liver disease while raising much needed funds for liver research. We appreciate everyone helping to keep the Liver Center Seed Grant program funded which supports research to find ways to prevent and cure liver disease.

The impact of charitable contributions are *measurable* and we'd like to share a few things which have been supported by our generous contributions to Friends of the Saint Louis University Liver Center:

- Since 2005, over \$5.3 million has been raised for research at the Saint Louis University Liver Center which has supported **50 Liver Center Seed grants** awarded to Liver Center members through a Request for Applications process. These directed research grants were established to provide bridge or seed grant funding to investigators while they work toward developing their projects, gathering preliminary data allowing them to submit external grant applications and publish their results. These seed grants have generated over \$29 million in external funding, such as the National Institutes of Health (NIH) and other agencies, enabling the continuation of vital research by Saint Louis University Liver Center investigators. The seed grant funding program has produced a current Return on Investment of 17.5. Many of these research studies are now part of national and international research programs to find cures and treatments to liver diseases.
- Over **\$169,992** was used for the purchase of supplies and equipment in support of clinical trials research and for basic science laboratories of the Liver Center investigators.
- Eight Summer Research Fellowships have been awarded, totaling \$28,000.

These things are not possible without community support, and donations at every level! Your support is critical in continuing cutting edge research.

We are thankful to our physicians, clinical staff, and investigators at Saint Louis University Liver Center and to you, our donors/sponsors/volunteers, for your financial support and volunteer involvement as we look ahead to opportunities for new discoveries and treatments for patients.



Saint Louis University Researcher Awarded \$1.9M NIH Grant to Study Short Bowel Syndrome

Ajay Jain, M.D., professor of pediatrics, pharmacology, and physiology, received \$1,893,750 from the National Institute of Diabetes and Digestive and Kidney Diseases of the National Institutes of Health. Bowel resection, a surgical procedure in which a diseased part of the intestine is removed, leads to SBS. Patients with SBS cannot maintain nutrition through regular feeding due to insufficient intestines. Such patients, in the absence of food, require intravenous nutrition via a process called Total Parenteral Nutrition (TPN), Jain said. There are tens of thousands of patients worldwide permanently dependent on TPN for their survival. These include adults, children, and newborn babies. Despite being on a lifesaving TPN therapy, SBS patients suffer from potentially fatal liver and gut injury with many patients requiring a multi-visceral transplant. Thus, this is a major research focus in gastroenterology and hepatology, Jain said. He further states that results from their novel studies highlight that altered gut-derived signals play a major role in driving injury mechanisms in SBS. "If we could restore these signaling pathways, then we could bring a paradigm change in the management and care of these patients," Jain said.

This NIH grant will evaluate the impact of novel molecules that he has been working on in preclinical models, to test their efficacy in mitigating the multisystem injury in SBS. He will also explore new signaling pathways that would open a new area of therapeutic targeting. As part of this funding, Jain will also use organoids, a highly specialized technique where organs are grown in the lab for further validation and to gain mechanistic insights. "We believe that we are on the verge of creating sustainable options for our sickest patients with SBS with our translational research and such could prove transformative not only as a treatment but advance science in unlocking the mysteries of the gut to systemic signaling, with far-reaching consequences," Jain said.

An internationally recognized expert, Jain has received national and international awards for his work. This year, Jain was awarded the Gerard Odell Prize for Excellence in Liver by the North American Society for Pediatric Gastroenterology, Hepatology and Nutrition. He was also recently awarded the international Stanley Dudrick Award from the American Society for Parenteral and Enteral Nutrition.

The prestigious \$1.9 million grant builds on previous research Jain has conducted. Jain has also received grant funding from the National Institutes of Diabetes and Digestive and Kidney Diseases; the North American Society for Pediatric Gastroenterology Hepatology and Nutrition; the American Society of Parenteral and Enteral Nutrition Rhoads Research Foundation; the American Liver Foundation; Mid-America Transplant Foundation and industry partners. Additionally, seed funding through SLU's Liver Center and President's Research Fund allowed Jain to conduct early proof-of-concept studies.

Jain serves as the director of the M.D./Ph.D. program for SLU's School of Medicine. He is also a professor of pediatrics in the Division of Pediatric Gastroenterology Hepatology and Nutrition in the SLU School of Medicine. He is a SLUCare pediatric hepatologist and gastroenterologist, the associate division chief of pediatric gastroenterology and the medical director of the pediatric liver transplant program at SSM Health Cardinal Glennon Children's Hospital.
